## Recollections of an (not ready to be called) Ancient Skier

I wonder how many of us can still recall our first day on skis? I can vividly remember that day, as a 10 year-old, now close to 68 years ago! My mother took my younger sister and me up to Snoqualmie Pass on a week day. We were out of school, because my older sister had come down with a case of mononucleosis, and we were quarantined. Tough luck. At that time, the Pass was not open for mid-week skiing, so no lifts were running. We climbed a gentle slope, and once I felt that first thrill of coasting downhill, I knew I was hooked!

That first day was sunny, but, as most of us who learned to ski at Snoqualmie know, we had plenty of opportunities to ski in less than ideal conditions – wet snow (aka Cascade cement), pouring rain, gripping the rope tow enough that our mitts and liners soon wore holes, and our parkas becoming soaked through. Even a plastic bag, with holes for head and arms, didn't do much good. An all day rope tow ticket cost \$1.50 back then, which fit my parents' budget just fine. Certainly, not mine. An all day chair lift ticket cost \$2.50, so I then decided I'd best find odd jobs around the neighborhood, to make that extra \$1.00. At 25 cents an hour, I only had to work 4 hours, so I could join the rest of my buddies whose parents thought the cost of a chair ticket was reasonable. Chalk that up to character building.

In the mid 50's, the Pass had one chair lift, one poma lift, and many rope tows. Do any of you remember what an A&T rope tow gripper was? That device clamped on to the rope, probably wearing it out, rather than the leather faced mitts that most of us wore. Surely, Webb Moffett wasn't happy about that. I never had a gripper, but no loss; I was much happier riding the chair lift up to the Thunderbird restaurant, skiing down all of its 400 vertical feet.

Prior to 1962, our family skied mostly at Ski Acres, and got to know the owners Ray and Virginia Tanner well. Occasionally, we'd take the excruciatingly (or so it seemed) long trip to Stevens Pass. My favorite visit there was in 1961, when the area promoted an international slalom competition event, featuring names like Anderl Molterer, Christian Pravda, and Stein Eriksen. I remember Peter Kennedy also raced. Stein's big claim to fame at that time was his famous flip, which people came from miles around, just to see. Pretty impressive, for this at the time 15 year-old.

At Snoqualmie, my favorite instructor was Stan deBruler, whose son Jay, Bruce Kirschner of K2 fame, myself, and others were part of the racing class. Our end of the season races in 1962 were a blast. I won second place, behind Bruce. Somewhere, I still have the trophy. Stan was a real gentleman; I kept in touch with him for many years thereafter.

At Ski Acres in 1957, a new instructor from Austria came on the scene – Leo Scheiblehner. Leo taught our advanced class when I was in 7th grade. He was a great skier, but with his heavy German accent, it wasn't easy to understand him. Leo would often say, "You gotz to ski like a ropinn in a poosh!" It took me years to figure out he was saying, "You've got to ski like a robin in a bush!" That was his technique – Leo was a very graceful skier, from whom I learned a lot.

When Crystal Mtn. opened for the 62/63 season, it was a natural for us to head there. Leo and his wife Mo, whom he had met and married when he went to Lake Tahoe for two or three seasons, also came to Crystal. In 1964, after Jack and Lila Corrock built the Alpine Inn, Mo and Leo managed both the inn and the restaurant. That summer, Leo, who was every bit as good a carpenter as he was a skier, built all the booths and chairs in the Snorting Elk Cellar. To my knowledge, those booths and chairs are still in use, close to 60 years later!

While my many years of skiing at Crystal are now in my rear-view mirror, I feel fortunate to have met so many great people there, most of whom I'm happy to call good friends. Sun Valley is now my home area, the perfect spot for us old timers to migrate to. Thanks to Ancient Skiers, I have the means to see those old friends. As I get older, I realize how much I value those relationships. I wouldn't have it any other way.

## Ski Resort News

#### **Going Cashless?**

Businesses, including major ski resorts like Vail Resorts, Snowbird, Killington, and Big Sky, have embraced cashless transactions, a trend driven by safety concerns during the pandemic. Vail Resorts, an industry leader, adopted this policy early on, and there are no signs of reverting. Mt Hood Meadows will also go cashless for the 2023/24 season to improve internal operations and enhance guest experience.

#### **Tamarack Expansion**

Boise National Forest has approved Tamarack's request to expand its terrain by over 2,000 acres. While this approval doesn't guarantee the expansion, it could potentially make the resort the eighth-largest in North America.

#### **Wildfire Support**

Big White Snow Ski Resort in British Columbia, Canada, supports wildfire evacuees by providing resources and assistance, embodying its family-friendly ethos.

#### Stevens Pass New Chairlift

During the off-season, Stevens Pass upgraded with a new four-seat chairlift and introduced the MyEpic app for passes and lift tickets. Renowned for its authentic PNW mountain experience, Stevens Pass offers excellent powder and off-piste terrain for guests to explore.

#### Flying & skiing in one simple package?

Alaska Airlines and Mountain Collective have introduced a new program that lets skiers bundle their international ski trip with flight bookings. This innovative offering allows members of Alaska Airlines' Mileage Plan to choose from 24 global ski resorts, streamlining travel and skiing arrangements into one convenient package.

#### Alterra Buys Schweitzer Mountain

Alterra Mountain Company, the parent company of Ikon Pass, has expanded its portfolio to include 17 ski resorts. Recently, the Colorado-based company acquired Idaho's Schweitzer Mountain Resort, which has been part of the Ikon Pass since the 2021-'22 season, offering limited access with seven days on the full pass and five days on the Base Pass.

#### **Three Injured After Lift Detached**

A sudden gust of wind caused a chair to detach from a lift at Thredbo Ski Resort in Australia, injuring three snowboarders. The incident occurred on the Kosciuszko Quad Express due to a "freak gust of wind." Wind speeds of around 33 miles per hour were recorded at the lift's top shortly before the accident.
